## LSU School of Dentistry Launches New Residency in Orofacial Pain

The LSU School of Dentistry is pleased to announce the launch of its Advanced Education Program in Orofacial Pain, an accredited, two-year residency program set to begin on July 1, 2025.

This new program is designed to address a growing need for specialized care in the field of orofacial pain — a dental specialty officially recognized by the American Dental Association in 2020. It reflects the vision of the late Dr. Henry Gremillion, former Dean of the School of Dentistry, and has been made possible through the continued support of current Dean Dr. John Gallo.

Each year, the program will welcome two residents for a comprehensive 24-month training experience. Upon completion, graduates will receive a Certificate in Advanced Education in Orofacial Pain and a Master of Science in Dentistry, making them eligible to sit for the American Board of Orofacial Pain examination.

Residents will receive in-depth clinical and academic training in the diagnosis and management of:

- Temporomandibular disorders (TMD)
- Headache disorders and facial pain
- Neuropathic conditions
- Burning mouth syndrome
- Sleep-related breathing disorders
- Other chronic or unexplained oral and facial pain



*Orofacial Pain Clinic: In order to support the new residency program, the TMD and Orofacial Pain Clinic as LSU Health is expanding their schedule to accommodate more patients.*

To support the program, the LSU Orofacial Pain Clinic will expand to a full-time schedule, open Monday through Friday, 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM, starting July 2025. The clinic offers a comprehensive range of services, including counseling, palliative care, oral appliances, trigger point injections, medications, laser pain therapy, physical therapy, oral sleep appliances, joint injections, joint manipulation, behavioral therapy, and lifestyle modification strategies. When advanced procedures such as arthrocentesis, arthroscopy, or joint surgery are required, collaboration with the Department of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery and appropriate referrals are made. Patients may also be referred to specialists in neurology, psychiatry, rheumatology, otolaryngology,

pulmonology, and other medical fields as needed. Given the complexity of these conditions, care is delivered through a coordinated interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary approach.

The program will be led by Dr. Rana Almudamgha, a board-certified orofacial pain specialist, alongside an experienced faculty team: Dr. Dale Ehrlich, Dr. Gary Klasser, Dr. Ron Auvenshine, Dr. Michael Shannon, and Dr. Gary Heir (Gratis).

# The Implications of Alpha-Gal Syndrome for Dental and Medical Treatment

## Introduction

The alpha-gal syndrome (AGS) is a serious, potentially life-threatening allergic reaction that can

occur after a tick bite, and is named for the molecule galactose-alpha-1,3-galactose, which is found in most mammals, except for humans and higher level primates, which produce antibodies to this foreign sugar molecule once introduced to it [1,2]. It is most commonly associated with a bite from the Lone Star tick in the United States, but can also be transmitted by different types of ticks in other areas of the world; it is further possible that other ecto-parasites, such as “chiggers”, could also be relevant [3, 4].

The biting tick injects a sugar molecule, alpha-gal, which leads to formation of an antibody in the recipient host [4]. The molecule is commonly present within the cells of

cows, pigs, lambs, goats, and most other mammals. When affected individuals eat or come into contact with such animal products, severe allergic reactions may occur [1, 4], making it imperative for dentists to be aware of the syndrome and how it is exacerbated.

In the United States, well over 100,000 cases of this syndrome were reported between 2010 and 2022, although many have probably gone undiagnosed or underreported [4, 5]. There is no cure, and it has been estimated that possibly hundreds of thousands of people may have been affected by AGS but have gone undiagnosed in the United States, according to a report

## LSU Dental Students Provide Free Care to Homeless Through Ozanam Inn Partnership

Every Saturday morning during the academic year, a team of dedicated LSU School of Dentistry (LSUSD) students are up early to serve some of New Orleans' most vulnerable residents. These student volunteers operate a free dental clinic at Ozanam Inn, a nonprofit shelter and service agency for the homeless and needy.

Ozanam Inn, founded in 1955 by the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, has long provided vital resources such as meals, shelter, and healthcare — all free of charge and without discrimination. Since 2014, LSUSD students and faculty have added dental care to that list through a partnership that continues to grow in scope and impact.

The student-run clinic offers assessments, immediate dental care, oral hygiene education, and referrals for more advanced procedures. The clinic operates alongside the medical services offered at Ozanam Inn, ensuring a holistic approach to patient care.

Two teams of students rotate each Saturday under the supervision of Dr. Sherrod “Shade” Quin and

Dr. Suezan McCormick, both Assistant Professors of Clinical Comprehensive & Operative Dentistry. Their guidance ensures quality care while also offering a valuable real-world learning experience for the students. Dr. John Ward, Assistant Professor of Clinical Comprehensive & Operative Dentistry, joined the team to assist Drs. Quin and McCormick in 2021.

Each dental class plays a distinct role in the clinic. First-year students manage paperwork, gather patient histories, and take vitals and x-rays. Second-year students assist upperclassmen and administer local anesthesia. Third-years are more hands-on with procedures, including tooth extractions when necessary. Fourth-year students lead the teams, acting as mentors and case managers — a role that mirrors their academic progression.

Fourth-year student and clinic liaison Sarah Berry, alongside third-year coordinator Trinity Foster, emphasized the mutual benefits of the program. “The patients are incredibly grateful,” Berry said.

“And for us, it’s a humbling and powerful reminder of why we entered this field.”

According to Berry and Foster, more than half of the dental students at LSU have volunteered at Ozanam Inn. The opportunity is so popular that there is often a waitlist for last-minute openings.

The clinic also serves as an educational hub. Before patient care begins, faculty lead short workshops covering clinic operations, procedural techniques, and practical insights that extend far beyond textbooks.

To further support the clinic, the LSUSD chapter of the American Student Dental Association (ASDA) recently held a fundraiser, reinforcing the ongoing need for supplies and equipment. While the School of Dentistry provides strong institutional support, the clinic needs continue to grow.

issued by the CDC in July, 2023 [6]. The Syndrome is most indigenous to the southern, central, and eastern portions of the United States, and can affect both children and adults [3, 4].

### Symptoms, detection, and treatment

The following characteristics occur in 85% of patient with AGS: onset of symptoms in adult life suddenly, after having had no problems with mammalian meat or byproducts in previous years; reactions ranging from pruritus, hives, angioedema, to anaphylaxis; gastrointestinal symptoms of diarrhea, cramping, and emesis, but with no cutaneous, cardiovascular, or respiratory manifestation; reactions that start 3 to 8 hours after exposure to meal products; positive testing for alpha-gal IgE (>.1 IU/mL) [7, 8]; improvement of symptoms when adhering to appropriate avoidance diet; and description of more effusive local reactions to tick or other arthropod bites, often including a report of an “index” bite that perhaps behaved differently than prior bites [9, 7].

Once the diagnosis of alpha-gal syndrome is made via a history

of delayed allergic reactions to red meat and a positive blood test for IgE to the alpha-gal molecule, this diagnosis also dictates the primary treatment, which is to avoid eating red and other forms of meat and byproducts, which may likely include dairy, gelatin, collagen, heparin, biological tissues, cancer drugs, monoclonal antibodies, certain vaccine components, anti-venom, magnesium stearate, and many other substances found in dental and medical materials [3, 4, 2].

Classical cases have symptoms onset in adult life after eating meat, with reactions ranging from only cutaneous signs to severe anaphylactic reactions requiring emergency treatment and hospitalization. Reactions typically start several hours pursuant to consumption or exposure to meat of mammalian origin; severity of the reaction is not predicted by the number of hours related to this delay. Further, how one responds clinically to a diet of avoiding red meat can help cement a diagnosis of this syndrome, with at least four out of five cases fitting this classical description [3].

### Dental and medical treatment implications

In a patient diagnosed with alpha-gal syndrome, until testing has proven otherwise, the dentist should assume that the sensitivity is significant, and thus should consider modifying dental treatment, being aware of all products placed into or onto any patient with AGS.

Some, but not necessarily all, products employed in dentistry may include:

- topical anesthetic gels
- prophylactic paste
- topical fluoride paste
- some antiseptic mouth washes, flosses, and chewing gum products
- casein and other milk protein derivatives, such as CPP-ACP, found in some chewing gums, lozenges, mouthwashes and chairside products marketed to reduce dental erosion, prevent and repair decalcification, and/or to desensitize teeth on exposed radicular surfaces
- gut sutures
- impression material
- bone grafts
- collagen membranes and other

- products such as CollaPlug, CollaTape
- gelatin-based products, such as pill capsules, Gelfoam, Surgifoam
- glycerin, such as in Propofol, some dentifrices and polishing agents
- heparin and thrombin
- some vaccines
- Lidocaine and Lidocaine patches (may have a slight amount of animal product, and the AGS safety issue on this anesthetic is controversial amongst reference sources)
- other “veiled” products may include arachidonic acid, arachidyl propionate, lactic acid, lactose monohydrate, stearate and magnesium stearate, stearic acid, myristic acid, oleic acid, and monoclonal antibiotics
- Acetaminophen-containing oral products, as may contain gelatin, glycerin, lactose monohydrate, magnesium stearate, and stearic acid
- Aspirin-containing oral products that may contain magnesium stearate

These are only a sampling of those medications utilized in patient care in dental settings. The treating dentist should understand the chemistry of all products being utilized in and on a patient diagnosed with AGS [10, 11, 2, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16].

It would seem wise to be on the lookout for those patients who may have an unusual possibly delayed immunological response following dental treatment, yet who have not to date revealed any diagnosis of AGS; referral for testing for this


